

- Homophones.



If a deer could cheer, what would a deer say?



"EA" plus "R" is tricky because it can make FOUR different sounds:






"Tear" is actually two different words and is pronounced two different ways:

want to go home yet.



I heard a bird, and a bird heard me. We heard each other by the old oak tree.


I heard the bird say that my feet were fat, so the bird heard me tell him that he was a rat.






I can hear my heart

The food on the floor is


for my cat. My cat likes

floor in the shape of a fish.




The door in the door is for my cat, and the door in the floor is for my rat. They each have a door to go outside, but my dog has no door — he is much too wide.

Dandy: Good; just fine.




My poor, poor cat

# 0Q + P

Usually, when an "O" and an "A" are together, the "O" makes his long sound, like in the words "soap" and "boat".

But when you add an "R," the "O" almost always makes the "or" sound.

and roar — and roar


and roar and roar.

SOAR up in the sky. I


would SOAR over the city

## OU + P


"OU" plus "R" is tricky because it can make TWO different sounds:








Although they have the same vowels, "you" and "your" make different vowel sounds.




Your nose is nice, but is it nice to you? Does it honk or beep every time you try to chew? Can your nose smell, or does your nose stink?

Your pretty, pretty nose is pretty bad, I think.









Their pet is a pig, and they like to put a wiq on their piq.


## homophones

Can (is able to) dance




Sometimes, homophones are spelled differently, like the words "there" and "their" —






Their pig wore a wig.



In the rest of this book, we are going to learn some homophones that are spelled differently.




They keep their hats

are small, small, small.




Their rose over there is pink. And their rose over there has a stink. The smell is so bad that their noses were glad to fall off over there by the sink.











I heard a herd of buffalo. I heard them in my sleep. And the herd of buffalo I heard had pink shoes on their feet.

Then my poor, poor cat will take a nap in the puddle of milk, just like that.




Someday I will see the sea, but the silly old sea will never see me.
