




Quick Start Guide



Read the book WITH your child. You read the "regular" text, and he/she reads the big, red words, sort of like reading the different parts in a play.

Help your child sound out the words as needed.






Read the book several times. This helps develop the eye muscles and left-to-right reading patterns that are necessary for reading.

Don't rush it. Body builders don't train in a day – neither does a child.





If your child is having difficulty, he/she might need more practice with simple short vowel words. Read or re-read the Progressive Phonics Beginner Books a few times, and then try this book again.

And most important of all, HAVE FUN!





and make sounds with them.


Like when the letter "s" sits next to the letter "t" — the "s" says, "ssss," and the "t" says, "tuh," and together they say, "st."

A lot of words use the "st" sound.



spell - the witch tried to sell a spell






Never spit when you spin around, because if you spit when you spin around, then... ewwww! The spit will land on you.

The letter "s" also likes to sit beside the letter "L."


The "s" says, "ssss," and the "L" says, "luh," and together they say, "sl." Can you say "sl"?






Sam likes to slam

snail - the snail is for sale





(If you need more words, try: sniff, snort, snout, snuggle, snarl, sneer and snack.)







The "s" says, "ssss," and the "c" says, "kuh," and together they say, "sc." Can you say, "sc"?




A lot of words use the "sc" sound. Say after me —



scar - my scar looks like a car




scary - my brother, Carey, isn't scary



scan - my eyes can scan the page


(If you need more words, try: scooter, scalp, scale, scone, scuff, scuba dive and scout.)

Sometimes, the letter "c" and the letter "k" sound exactly the same. Because of this, we sometimes write the "sc" sound with an "s" and a "k" —





(If you need more words, try: sky, skunk, skull, skeleton, skiing and skinny.)







I have skin. A fish has skin too, but the skin of a fish is silvery blue.

I never want to have skin like a fish — I don't want to look like a big silver dish.






I like to skip along the street. I like to skip with both my feet. But I fell down and hurt my knee, and I got a scab, oh lucky me.



A lot of words use the "sw" sound. Say after me —




swing - I like to sing on the swing

(If you need more words, try: sweep, sweater, swamp and swallow.)






I can **SWim** when I giggle.






The letter "t" also likes to sit beside the letter "w."
