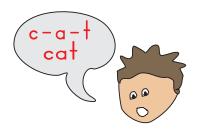
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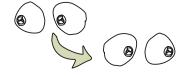
Quick Start Guide



Read the book WITH your child. You read the "regular" text, and he/she reads the big, red words, sort of like reading the different parts in a play.

Help your child sound out the words as needed.

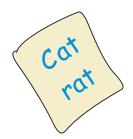




Read the book several times. This helps develop the eye muscles and left-to-right reading patterns that are necessary for reading.

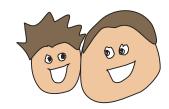
Don't rush it. Body builders don't train in a day – neither does a child.





If your child is having difficulty, he/she might need more practice with simple short vowel words. Read or re-read the Progressive Phonics Beginner Books a few times, and then try this book again.

And most important of all, HAVE FUN!



Words that a child should be able to read by now are printed with BLUE ink – if your child can't read them easily, go back and review the earlier books.

The new words being learned are "big, red words".

Words or grammatical constructions that a child has not learned yet are written in black ink.

These words are supposed to be read by the parent/teacher. **

** Your child can try to read them, but don't worry too much about them. They are taught later, either in later Progressive Phonics books, or in spelling or grammar at school.


We don't have a letter in the alphabet for the "sh" sound, so we have different ways of writing it.

The way we use the most is:

Sh


You can't actually hear an "S" or an "H", but that is one of the ways that we write the "sh" sound.

Sometimes the "sh" sound is at the beginning of a word, like in:




The sheep showed me her shoes.


And sometimes the "sh" sound is at the end of a word:



(If you need more words, try: cash, crash, splash, flesh, fresh, wish, squish, gosh, wash, and Josh; and shape, share, short, shirt, shell, shower and shark.)



If a fish in a dish could have one wish, what would the fish wish for? Would the fish wish for a bigger dish or to swim in the sea once more?

Yes, my fish is always quiet, not like my brother's toys.




My friend, Josh, rides

I did not take the trash out, and the trash pile grew and grew. I did not take the trash out — I left it all for you.


When the letter "S" and the letter "T" are sitting next to each other, they may the "st" sound.

The "st" sound can go at the beginning of a word:




An "s" and a "t" work together to make the "st" sound. Can you hear the "s" and the "t"?

And sometimes the "st" sound goes at the end of a word:



(If you need more "st" words, try: last, past, best, chest, list, twist, cost, lost, must, and trust; and step, stone, stay, stand, strong and stomach.)

that I ran past me.




If I was the Witch of the West, I would be the best of the best.

I was the last person in bed last night. I was the last to go to sleep.


And now I need to rest a little more — so let me rest and close the door.



"I must have dinner, now!"


I said. "I must have milk,

please, so nobody cared.




I was just about to fall asleep, when I heard a funny noise.

Together, the letters "S" and "K" say "sk". This sound can be at the beginning or the end of a word:



(If you need more "sk" words, try: desk, ask, frisk and risk; and skeleton, ski, skate, skip and skin.)




I skip faster than anyone —

ask anyone if that's true.


If you ask me for a race,

"Boo-hoo."




The man behind the desk is wearing a mask. I want to ask why he wears a mask, but because I am so shy, I want YOU to go ask why.

Some words that end with an "S" sound are spelled with TWO letter "S's".



(If you need more words, try: class, pass, chess, press, miss, Swiss, across, loss, and fuss.)




When I am at school, I miss my dog, I miss my cat, but not my brother's frog.

I kiss my cat and dog, but I would rather kiss dirt than kiss a frog.



I can walk on grass,
but not on glass.







Some words that have one "S" at the end make the "zzz" sound, not the "sss" sound.



And sometimes the "zzz" sound at the end of a word is spelled with the letter "Z" — usually with two letter "Z's". Not many words are written this way — these are the most common (most used) words that are written this way:




The word "was" is weird. It looks like "has", but it sounds like "fuzz".


A big bee Was on my hat.

I knew it Was a bee — but why Was a bee on top of me?



"Buzz, buzz, buzz."


When the bee was done brushing all his fuzz, he said, "Buzz, what a lot of fuzz that was."

I would kiss like this.


And if I was a bee, I would buzz, buzz, buzz.

We don't have a letter in the alphabet for the "th" sound, so we write it with a "T" and an "H".




You can't actually hear a "T" or an "T", but that is how we write it.

Sometimes the "th" sound is at the beginning of a word, like in...




I thought a thousand thoughts


And sometimes the "th" sound is at the end of a word:



(If you need more words, try: math, path, truth, breath, mouth, month, Earth and cloth; and thin, thing, thank, this, that and those.)
